The Coastal Plain, page24

- Geographical region of the United States
- Flat, low land
- Along the Atlantic Ocean
- The ocean is one of its boundaries
- Stretches along the east coast
- Begins along the coast of Massachusetts
- Extends to Florida and west into Texas and the country of Mexico

The Interior Plains, page 26

- Geographical region of the United States
- Flat, rolling tall-grass prairie
- Does not have a boundary that touches the ocean
- Stretch across the middle of the country
- Stretches from the Appalachians in the east to the Rocky Mountains in the west
- Many streams and rivers in the prairie
- The Great Plains are a part of the Interior Plains.
- The Great Plains stretch from southern Texas into Canada.
- There are few rivers in the Great Plains.
- The Great Plains are extremely flat with almost no trees.

The Appalachians, page 25

- Geographical region of the United States
- Eastern part of the United States
- Not flat
- The eastern side of the Appalachian Mountains is filled with wide valleys and hills called the Piedmont.
- The Appalachians run from southern Canada to central Alabama.
- The oldest mountains in the United States
- Made up of smaller mountain ranges
- Highest peaks are 7,000 feet

The Rocky Mountains, page 27

- Geographical Region of the United States
- Cover much of the western United States
- Our country's largest and longest mountain range
- Stretch from Mexico through Canada and into Alaska
- made up of smaller mountain ranges
- much younger than the Appalachians
